
Successfully advocated for an additional **\$70.5 million** in operating aid via the Outcomes-Based Allocation (OBA) formula in the state budget.



Hosted inaugural legislative day at the State House; met with 30 members of the NJ Legislature.

Provided policy expertise and feedback on legislation, including:

- supporting FAFSA completion for high school students, summer tuition aid grants, and increasing bidding threshold for public research universities, which are now law;
- securing amendments to a trustee training bill;
- offering testimony on meal plan donation legislation and transfer policy legislation;
- successfully advocating for amendments to transcript withholding legislation; and
- submitting comments on fiscal monitoring and career-oriented program regulatory proposals.

- Contributing to ongoing dialogue with state policymakers on the future of higher education in the State.
- Identifying opportunities for institutions to share resources, staff, and/or contractors to reduce overhead costs.
